<p>Simile Compares 2 unlike things using “like” or “as”. <i>“My lyrics are like fire.”</i></p>			
<p>Metaphor Compares 2 unlike things not using like or as. <i>“My lyrics are fire.”</i></p>			
<p>Alliteration Some consonant sound at the beginning of every word. <i>“Sally sits separate from Sara.”</i></p>			
<p>Oxymoron Words that are placed together with opposite meanings. <i>“Sara’s fight with Mike was a forgetful memory.”</i></p>			
<p>Hyperbole Major exaggeration for humor or to make a point. <i>“Jim, this is the worst present ever given in the history of mankind!”</i></p>			
<p>Personification Human qualities to non-human things. <i>“A thousand thoughts raced through my head.”</i></p>			
<p>Allusion When mentioning a famous person, event, place, or even another literary work. <i>“During the concert, she sang a Mariah Carey note.”</i></p>			
<p>Onomatopoeia A word that shows the sound. <i>“The drums rat-a-tat-tat down the field during the football half-time.”</i></p>

<p>Idiom An expression/phrase where the meaning is different from literal meaning of its words. <i>"My lips are sealed"</i></p>			
<p>Pun A play on words that have similar sound, but different meanings. <i>How do celebrities keep cool? They have many fans.</i></p>			
<p>Verbal Irony A difference between what is said and what is meant. (sarcasm)</p>			
<p>Dramatic/Situational Irony The reader understands more about the events the character does/what actually happens is opposite of what is expected)</p>
